Covid 19 Update

Thank you for people's positive attitudes to requests to do PCR's. Following a second, related case last week we have 'stepped up' measures in the school and, currently, we have had no further positive cases. If this remains the case over the weekend (a 10 day gap) we will 'step back' to our normal running whilst promoting good hygiene; testing, isolation and management of positive cases. We have included the year groups for clubs in the diary above to help remind parents as they re-open to all the originally advertised groups. Please continue to remember:

- People who have Covid symptoms or have a positive PCR result have to isolate (10 days).

- Close contacts of positive cases will be notified. Close contacts do not have to isolate if they: are **fully** vaccinated/ are below the age of 18 years 6 months/ have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial/ are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons).
 <u>Close contacts are asked to do a PCR and regular LFD tests.</u> If your children are informed they are close contacts, of cases outside school, please let us know and confirm test results.
- Please be reassured that, for the vast majority of children, COVID-19 will be a mild illness and that, in addition, the vaccine programme is providing protection.

Staffing Challenges

The school is still facing significant staffing challenges and we are trying to cover all bases but it is certainly a strain (especially when trying to 'step up' Covid measures). At times we have been 7 staff down which is significant for a small school.

If you have noticed, we apologise, but we are doing our best to cover with as little impact on provision as possible. We really look forward to getting back to as close to full staffing compliment as possible and have in place all the provision we aspire to.

Rea Class

In phonics, Year one will be on rapid reading of the tricky words some, come,and there, automatic spelling the tricky words have, was and you, and the sounds we will focus on are: cccvc and cccvcc words.

In phonics and spellings, year two will be focusing on tricky words. We will also be learning the spelling of some homophones, sea, see, blue, blew, flour, flower, bear, bare, bee, be, whole and whole.

This week, we will also introduce mathletics homework. Children need to attempt one mathletics activity that has been set for them. They will take home with their homework today a guide to using matheltics. This will help you to get them logged on. We will ensure mathletics passwords and usernames are in children's reading records.

Corve Class
