THANK YOU TO ALL THOSE PARENTS WHO READ REGULARLY (4 x a week) WITH THEIR CHILD (a sharing book or their decodable book). Fill in reading records so we can reward and celebrate this. Below are a few reminders of why this is so important:

WORDS HAVE POWER

A balance of enjoyment of books (any books – sharing books) and a systematic program (decodable books) to be confident with the mechanics



Ensuring children become fluent (carefully taught mechanics and practice) and engaged readers at the very earliest stages also helps avoid the vicious circle of reading difficulty and demotivation that makes later intervention more challenging.

We know that emotional engagement is the tipping point between leaping into the reading life or remaining in a childhood bog where reading is endured only as a means to other ends

(The Reading Framework 2021)

'Parents who engage their children in books prepare them to become committed, enthusiastic readers.

Book related talk introduces children to language they might not hear in ordinary conversation.....








Let's Get Ready!

Shropshire Libraries and the Education Improvement Service Early Years Team are launching resources during National Libraries Week to support parents to enjoy talking and reading to their babies and young children. The Let's Get Ready Bookbags have been developed as part of the Year of Making Language Matter. This is a Shropshire initiative in response to the Government's goal to halve the number of children leaving reception year without the appropriate level of communication and language skills, by 2028. The bookbags contain four books which explore daily routines and early first experiences. They are designed to help young children to deal with change and prepare them for the next steps in their lives. Guidance sheets emphasise the importance of parents sharing books and language from the birth of their children. The bags can be borrowed for free from any library for 3 weeks. ## Early Talk and Early Talk Boost

Congratulations to our Nursery team who are now trained in delivering Early Talk and Early Talk Boost. Early Talk and Early Talk Boost are targeted interventions aimed at children aged 2-4-year-old to boost their language skills to narrow the gap between them and their peers. The programme aims to accelerate children's progress in language and communication by an average of 6 months, after a nine-week intervention. # EYFS (Nursery and Reception) News

#### Reception News:

Our Talk for Writing Story: The Three Billy Goats Gruff

Reception have been planning how they would overcome the problem in the story. We have started 'Helicopter stories' bringing our own stories to life through role play.

In maths, Reception have explored how numbers can be composed of 1s and, from this, begin to investigate the composition of 3 and 4. Composing and de-composing numbers involves children investigating part-whole relations, e.g. seeing that 3 can be composed of 1 and 2. The children have learned from practical experience that a 'whole' is made up of smaller parts and is, therefore, bigger than its parts.

#### How can you help at home this week?

- Read and share the stories inside your child's reading folder at least 4 times a week.
- Please look inside your child's reading record to find which letter sounds we have learnt this week.
- Practise using a knife and fork independently at home.

#### Using a Knife and Fork

Using a combination of cutlery requires the development of many skills including hand-eye coordination, fine motor skills and postural control.

#### Sitting Posture

It is important your child has a good sitting posture by having their feet flat on the floor, sitting well back in the chair and having the table at elbow height.

#### Holding the cutlery

Encouraging a good grasp from the start will help with learning how to use a combination of cutlery. The most functional cutlery grasp is having the index fingers pointed down the cutlery. On the fork the index finger pointing down the back, and on the knife pointed down the edge towards the blade. If your child has difficulty remembering to point their index fingers down the cutlery, place stickers on the cutlery or paint a dot where the tip of their finger should be.



#### Knife and Fork Practice

Practice is the best way for a child to learn how to cut using a knife and fork! Practice could take place at meal times or through cutting playdough.

- 1. Stabbing the fork into the food/playdough and holding the fork steady.
- 2. Placing the knife behind the fork and cutting with a back and forth action. Children sometimes place the knife very close the fork prongs. Therefore encourage them to listen for when they are doing this as they can hear the knife against the fork.
- 3. Practice picking up the pieces of food/playdough through stabbing with a fork.

#### Hints and Tips

- If your child has trouble with the plate moving while they are eating, a non-slip mat could be put underneath the plate to hold it steady.
- Practicing with individual cutlery, such as practicing with a knife to spread butter on bread, or cutting various foods. Practice with fork in picking up food/playdough and then placing them in a bowl.
- · Hand over hand guidance, through placing your hands over the child and guiding their hands through the activity.
- · Show the child what to do, sit next to them and talk them through the task.

Following on from last week's Friday Forest Fun session, we continued to explore our fabulous forest area, practised keeping within the boundaries and remembering the rules to stay safe. An added dimension, was playing hide 'n' seek along with pretending to be squirrels, gathering acorns.















#### Rea Class Information

In phonics, year one will be introduced to the new alternative spellings of some of our sounds.

On Monday, they will learning about 'ay' making the 'ai' sound.

On Tuesday, they will learn about 'ou' making the 'ow' sound.

On Wednesday, they will learn about 'oy' making the 'oi' sound.

On Thursday, they will learn about 'ea' making the 'ee' sound.

On Friday, we will have a review day of all the above sounds, and will sort words with 'oy' and 'ay' graphemes.

We will also read the tricky words said, says, you, do, like, little, push, put, pull and full throughout the week.

# In Spellings, year two will be:

On Monday, using our 'Grow the Code' chart (also found in reading records) to spell words.

On Tuesday, practising chunking polysyllabic words for spellings.

On Wednesday, proofreading sentences with common exception words in them.

On Thursday, using 'Grow the Code' with polysyllabic words.

On Friday, practising common exception words and specifically learning the tricky parts.

This week, there will be spellings homework. These will be sent home as a look, say, cover, write, check sheet. There is a column to practise every day. Additionally, spellings have been set as a '2do' in Purple Mash, that will be available for children to access at home.

In maths, year one will be:

#### Regrouping numbers.

- Ordering numbers, consecutive and non-consecutive.
- Sequencing numbers and finding missing numbers in sequences.
- Using counting on and exploring the 'turnarounds' when doing this, eg I start at 2 and count on 7 - where do I land? and I start at 7 and count on 2 where do I land?

#### In maths, year two will be:

- Counting on a hundred square, so that the tens and ones digits change, and analysing which numbers will achieve this.
- Ordering and comparing values to 100, including different representations and money.
- Placing numbers up to 100 on a number line in the correct places, including blank numbers lines.

## Harvest Festival

The children will be celebrating the Harvest Festival in church on Friday 7th

October. Unfortunately, due to extensive building works in the church, we are only able to use the side chapel. We have considered using our hall but the fire risk restrictions would only allow 112 and we fill this ourselves.

As a result, for this year, we are unable to invite parents to join us but we will take lots of photos to share.

During the Harvest Festival we will celebrate the season and give thanks for our food and fruits of the season. This is also a big educational opportunity for children in understanding about the variety of food and where it comes from. It would be lovely if children could bring in a donation for Bridgnorth Food Bank (ideas below) and/or one fresh produce item so children can see the variety of 'fruits of the season'.

# Applying for Benefit Related 'Free School Meals'

Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 get their lunches provided through the government. However there is also Benefit Related Free School Meals where parents are in receipt of one or more of the benefits below. If you are eligible the free school meals at lunchtime continue into KS2 and the school gets additional funding to help support provision in school and, where appropriate, other items such as tutoring, after school clubs, music lessons etc. The process is confidential and children do not know that they are eligible.

Apply if you are in receipt of one or more of below:

- Universal credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income support
- Income-based jobseeker's allowance
- Income-related employment and support allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of pension credit
- $\bullet$  Child tax credit (provided you're not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working tax credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for working tax credit
  In addition, the following pupils will be protected against losing their free school meals as follows:
  From 1 April 2018, all existing free school meals claimants will continue to receive free school meals whilst
  universal credit is rolled out. This will apply even if their earnings rise above the new threshold during that
  time
- In addition, any child gaining eligibility for free school meals after 1 April 2018 will be protected against losing free school meals during the universal credit rollout period
- Once universal credit is fully rolled out, any existing claimants that no longer meet the eligibility criteria at that point (because they are earning above the threshold or are no longer a recipient of universal credit) will continue to receive free school meals until the end of their current phase of education (i.e. primary or secondary)


The universal credit rollout is currently expected to complete in March 2023.
