This week we have looked at the nouns in the story. We've been orally creating new sentences using one of the nouns from the story.





Reception News:

Our talk for writing story: The Train Ride

In Reception we have started a new topic focussing our learning and vocabulary around transport. Please see the attached curriculum map to see what skills we will be learning.

In maths, we have been deepening the children's understanding of 5 as a quantity by linking the number itself to the 5 fingers on one hand. The children have explored ways to represent numbers to 5 using both their fingers and the Hungarian number pattern. These key representations will help to underline the 'fiveness' of 5 and provide structures that will support its relationships with other numbers.

In phonics, we have learnt the digraphs (two letters

making one sound) ff | SS



How can you help at home?

- -Keep reading and sharing the stories inside your child's reading folder at least 4 times a week.
- -Review the letter sounds we have learnt in class, you will notice the cards have been changed from picture
- -letter to just the letter-grapheme.
- -Play a dice game this weekend, practise turn taking and subitising the number spots on.

Forest Fun:

As you are already aware, we have been fortunate to extend our Friday Forest Fun sessions for a further 4 weeks. This will enable us to focus on the change in Seasons, and use our Senses to help us.

Here are the photos from our last session, when we launched and tested the rafts we had made for the Three Billy Goat's Gruff, had a go at Conker drilling to make a 'Conker' numberline and practiced our culinary skills in the Mud Kitchen, making Pumpkin Soup, Conker 'hot' chocolate, and other Muddy Mixtures. We finished off the session and our first half term with a hot chocolate and marshmallows for an added treat!














Rea Class News

Maths - Year one will be continuing to add one more and one less to teens numbers.



What's the same and what's different about the three numbers?

Year 2 will be:

Relating tens and one equipment to money and making comparisons.

Year 1 phonics will be:

Year 2 phonics and spelling will be:

• Revision of different ways of making the or sound: or (horse), aw (dawn), au (launch), aur (dinosaur), oor (floor), al (talk), a (ball), oar (roar) and ore (store). We will be considering how to make the best choices for spelling words with the 'or' sound when writing.

Homophones to, too and two.

Spelling homework for year ones will be some common words that use ir, ie and ue sounds.

Spelling homework for year twos will be practising words from their tricky word lists in reading records.

Maths homework will be at least fifteen minutes on numbots
