
Reception News:

Our Talk for Writing: Writing captions / sentences about our trip to the British Motor Museum

In maths, this week we have begun to look at composition. We have focussed on the language of 'whole' and 'part'. By investigating our own bodies and familiar toys to understand that whole things are often made up of smaller parts and that a whole is, therefore, bigger than its parts.

How can you help at home over the weekend?

- -Keep reading and sharing the stories inside your child's reading folder at least 4 times a week.
- -Review the letter sounds on the tag attached to your child's reading record
- -Practise reading our tricky words.





The children thoroughly enjoyed their trip to the British Motor Museum on Tuesday this week.







Following on from using our 'Senses' last week, we continued to practice describing things. We used a collection of objects that we found down at Pool Meadow, added them to our 'Touchy Feely' box, then took it in turns to wear a blindfold and describe it to our friends. We also incorporated smell into our session. As we went on a walk, Mrs Smith spotted some evidence left by fairies, which we then tried to track down following their scent. We discovered that if we rubbed leaves between our fingers, they also left a scent!







Rea Class News

Year one phonics will focus on:

Monday - split e-e as in these. New tricky word "house".

Tuesday - ew as in few and chew. New tricky word "mouse".

Wednesday - ie making the ee sound as in field. New tricky word "water".

Thursday - aw as in draw and straw. New tricky word "want".

Friday - review day.

Year two spellings will focus on:

Monday - Identifying short and long vowel sounds.

Tuesday - The "j" sound spelt as "ge" after long vowel sounds, digraphs and consonant blends eg cage large and hinge.

Wednesday - The "j" sound spelt as "dge" after short vowel sounds. eg edge, badge and fridge.

Thursday - Proof reading texts that contain the "j" sound as "j", "g", "dge" and "ge".

Friday - Using our spelling journal and dictation.

Maths next week will focus on:

Year 1 -

In mastering numbers, we will be reasoning about the pairs of numbers that make 10.

We will also be:

Continuing our work on calendars and days of the week.

Identifying all of the parts and the whole when all parts are given.

Regrouping numbers in different ways.





Using cubes (bar models) to show equivalence between different groups of numbers.



Year 2 -

In mastering numbers this week, we will take an in-depth investigation into the composition of the numbers from 11-20.

We will also be:

Continuing our work on comparing intervals of time.


Recapping using "think 10" regrouping and deciding which is the most efficient way to solve addition calculations.

Using 10 to add three single digit numbers


Using reordering to add more than 3 single digit numbers.

I know that 7 is 3 fewer than 10. I also know that 6 = 3 + 3. So I can use 'Think 10'. 7 + 3 is 10 and 3 more is 13. 7 + 6 = 7 + 3 + 3 = 10 + 3 = 13





Pupils then re-order the calculation so that the total can be calculated more easily rather than by counting on.

Brake's top tips for keeping children safe

Children under 8 should always hold a grown up's hand when walking near roads

Children under 10 should not cycle on roads, they should keep to cycle paths away from motorised traffic

Children should always wear a helmet when cycling to protect their head if they fall off



Phone Hacking

Phone hacking is the act of accessing a smartphone, its communications, or its data without consent. Phone hacking can range from stealing personal details to listening in on phone conversations. There are several ways someone can hack a phone, including using phishing attacks, tracking software, and unsecured Wi-Fi networks.

Phones are popular targets for hackers, because they contain so much personal information all in one place. Smartphones hold everything from email and phone contacts to banking and social media details. Hackers can sell this data on the darkweb., use it to commit identity theft, or carry out a host of other crimes.

We are hearing of increasing cases of this and upsetting criminal activity as a result.

Prayer Project with the Diocese of Hereford

Our school has been selected to be part of a research project led by the Diocese of Hereford's Education Team. This project will be exploring the following question: How can we as churches and church schools encourage primary school

we as churches and church schools encourage primary school children to develop a prayer life outside of the school setting? The project aims to help the Diocese develop resources to support churches, schools and families in exploring prayer in different ways. The research project is being funded through a grant from the national Church of England Growing Faith Foundation. As part of the research, we will be inviting a small group of pupils to form a focus group for this study. These pupils will take part in a filmed group interview to explore what they understand about prayer, when they pray and what helps them to pray. Permission forms will come out this week. A working group formed by the Education Team, school teachers and local church leaders, will then use the children's answers to explore ideas for new resources.


