

### **Rea News**

Spellings next week for year 2 will focus on identifying rules for adding suffixes.

Phonics next week for year 1 will be: recapping all of our phase 3, 4 and 5 words and showing off the different words that we can read for our teacher. You can help by practising the sounds in the back of your child's reading record, and listening to them read regularly (4 times per week).

# The importance of school attendance - make sure your child isn't missing out.

### Did you know?

- The pupils with the highest attainment at the end of key stage 2 and key stage 4 have higher rates of attendance?
- Pupils not meeting the expected standard in reading, writing and maths at the end of KS2 have a higher absence rate than other children?
- At KS4, absence for pupils not achieving a grade 9 to 4 was more than twice as high as those achieving grade 9 to 5 (8.8% compared to 3.7%)?
- For our most vulnerable pupils, regular attendance is an important protective factor in making sure trusting relationships are built, needs are identified and support is given?

The message is clear:


If children are in school they do better and are supported better.

We know some pupils find it harder than others to attend school and we want to build strong trusting relationships with pupils and parents to ensure no-one is missing out.

So what is good attendance? Below is a chart that may help understand:



Don't miss out on the education you deserve.



We are seeing a significant increase in holidays in term time. **Holidays in term time are not an exceptional circumstance and do significantly disrupt learning patterns.** There are 190 school days in an academic year leaving 175 days free for families and those working in education to take holidays. Penalties or fines (£120 each parent) will be issued by the Local Education Authority.

Please support us in supporting your child with their education by making sure their attendance is above 94% (please see recent pupil reports for your child's figure).



Please find below details of educational trips that we are planning during the summer term.



3 - Severn Class Trip

On Tuesday 18th July 2023, children in Severn Class will be visiting Enginuity. They will be able to explore the museum and attend a 'power buggie' workshop. FoSPS have very kindly covered half of the cost of the transport, we are requesting a voluntary contribution of £12 per child to cover the rest of the cost of the trip - for those children eligible for benefit related FSM this is reduced by 50% to £6.

4 - Corve Class Trip

On Monday 12th June 2023, children in Corve Class will be visiting the Blists Hill Museum in Ironbridge. As well as exploring the museum they will be attending a 'Victorian School' workshop.

FoSPS have very kindly covered half of the cost of the transport, we are requesting a voluntary contribution of £ 19.50 per child to cover the rest of the cost of the trip  $\cdot$  for those children eligible for benefit related FSM this is reduced by 50% to £9.75  $\cdot$  (this includes £3 spending money per child which will be converted into coins at the Blists Hill Bank).

# Toilet Project at St. Marys Church, Stottesdon

Please see message below from Chris Tibbits regarding the Heritage Project news.

As a school we use the Church a lot, if you are able to support in anyway it would be very welcome.

Here, at last, is an opportunity for everyone in the community to contribute to the project: it has always been our intention to provide a toilet facility as part of the massive restoration investment at St Mary's. Sadly, as much more than planned had to be spent eliminating the dry rot and replacing the roof coverings with 33,000 new tiles, we are **short of between £20-25,000** to meet this most 'basic of needs'. We should explain that, with no mains drainage on site, the loo is not a cheap facility.... it has to be 'off grid' composting toilet since a septic tank is not appropriate in a churchyard. So this is an urgent call for financial help to complete the job - we have a most generous grant from the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust and a donation from one local business to get us underway .... can you help towards the remaining £11-15,000?? Please get in touch if you might be able to assist - and thank you so much for thinking about this!
