


No Outsiders





Everyone different, everyone welcome.
















Tuesday: Reverend Daborn reinforced our generosity theme with 'loving others as we love ourselves' (Mark 12.31) with real examples in day to day life

| Getting Ready for School Tip Listening Skills | Listening Skills To get the best out of school, and for their own safety, they will also need to follow instructions and understand rules. It is therefore a good idea to discourage your children from interrupting other people's conversations. Similarly, sitting still does not always come naturally to children. Family mealtimes are a good opportunity to practice many of these skills, including waiting their turn to talk and helping to tidy up afterward. |

Reception news

Talk for Writing: Mr Gumpy's Outing This week Reception have been writing Mr.Gumpy's Outing simple descriptions about the characters John Burn and objects in the story. The children have role played in a rowing boat learning new vocabulary as we pretended to travel down a river. This week's focus has been on assessing and deepening the children's understanding of our counting system by Maths Language Focus: tagging each object in a group of up to 10 objects (1-to-1 Counting beyond 20 is an important focus knowing number names to 10 and their order (stable order principle) this week. Unlike other languages (e.g. knowing that the last number counted gives the total in the set Welsh, Mandarin), English 'teen' number (cardinal principle) names do not follow a logical pattern; we counting up to 10 things that can't be seen or tagged, such as jumps, say 'eleven, twelve, thirteen' instead of hops, sounds, etc. (abstraction principle) 'ten-one, ten-two, ten-three' understanding that the quantity remains the same when (up to 10) It is only when we count beyond 20 that objects are counted in a different order (order irrelevance principle) the pattern of our number system begins developing strategies to keep track of what has and has not been to become clear. counted (e.g. rearranging objects into a line, moving objects as they're counted) recognising the pattern of the counting system, when beginning to count beyond 20. We have read the following words in phonics this week: street screen stair strong Phonics: scoop free clear Summer 2 Week 2 slight smear spoil clown Long vowel sounds in words Tricky words: pure sure little were was

On Monday, Rea class will be making our own measuring cylinders to measure capacity of liquids. We are looking for 1 litre or bigger clean, appropriate plastic bottles to help with this. If you have any bottles to recycle could you please sent them into school?

Spellings next week for year 2 will focus on our common exception words and identifying words to practise from our writing.


Phonics next week for year 1 will be reviewing which sounds and tricky words learnt so far need revisiting.

The importance of school attendance - make sure your child isn't missing out.

Did you know?

- The pupils with the highest attainment at the end of key stage 2 and key stage 4 have higher rates of attendance?
- Pupils not meeting the expected standard in reading, writing and maths at the end of KS2 have a higher absence rate than other children?
- At KS4, absence for pupils not achieving a grade 9 to 4 was more than twice as high as those achieving grade 9 to 5 (8.8% compared to 3.7%)?
- For our most vulnerable pupils, regular attendance is an important protective factor in making sure trusting relationships are built, needs are identified and support is given?

The message is clear:

If children are in school they do better and are supported better.

We know some pupils find it harder than others to attend school and we want to build strong trusting relationships with pupils and parents to ensure no-one is missing out.

So what is good attendance? Below is a chart that may help understand:



We are seeing a significant increase in holidays in term time. Holidays in term time are not an exceptional circumstance and do significantly disrupt learning patterns. There are 190 school days in an academic year leaving 175 days free for families and those working in education to take holidays. Penalties or fines (£120 each parent) will be issued by the Local Education Authority.

Please support us in supporting your child with their education by making sure their attendance is above 94% (please see recent pupil reports for your child's figure).

Afterward, they enjoyed exploring the Victorian town.











1 - Severn Class Trip

Toilet Project at St. Marys Church, Stottesdon

Please see message below from Chris Tibbits regarding the Heritage Project news.

As a school we use the Church a lot, if you are able to support in anyway it would be very welcome.

Here, at last, is an opportunity for everyone in the community to contribute to the project: it has always been our intention to provide a toilet facility as part of the massive restoration investment at St Mary's. Sadly, as much more than planned had to be spent eliminating the dry rot and replacing the roof coverings with 33,000 new tiles, we are **short of between £20-25,000** to meet this most 'basic of needs'. We should explain that, with no mains drainage on site, the loo is not a cheap facility.... it has to be 'off grid' composting toilet since a septic tank is not appropriate in a churchyard. **So this is an urgent call for financial help to complete the job** - we have a most generous grant from the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust and a donation from one local business to get us underway can you help towards the remaining £11-15,000?? Please get in touch if you might be able to assist - and thank you so much for thinking about this!
