Nursery Phonics Workshop rearranged for Monday 3rd July 2023 - 2.30pm to 3.10pm

Would You Rather?	Little Wandle Foundations for Reading: Would you rather drink snail squash or eat mashed worms? Help a witch make stew? Tickle a monkey? Or maybe - if you could really be anyone or do anything in the world - would you rather just be you? A story full of 'Would you rather' questions. The children have enjoyed exploring these questions. We have focused on the following verbs: tickle, dance, skate, sleep and nouns: snow, jungle, eagle, hippo. Some of our Pre-school children have had a go at answering and explaining why they would rather.

	Playing Games			
Getting Ready for School Tip	Playing games can be a lot of fun but can be quite difficult for young children. They have to learn how to take turns and wait while someone else has a go. It is best to start playing games with just two people, the child and an adult. Later, when they understand about taking turns and can wait without getting too impatient, another player can be included. Winning is very important to young children and losing can seem a disaster. You can help by talking about losing before it happens. It is important to praise efforts to control their tears or anger and to ignore any big fuss they may make. It is not helpful to always let children win.			
	It helps to:			
Playing Games	 Explain the rules carefully before you start to play. Plan to end the game before your child gets tired or bored. Give some warning about when you will finish, for example when everyone has had one more turn. Encourage your child to finish the agreed number of turns and to help put the pieces away afterwards. 			

Reception news

Talk for Writing:	Mr Gumpy's Outing This week Reception have been authors and illustrators, planning and writing their own narratives, with a character, a setting the character was travelling to, a problem and luckily a solution. And even a front cover! The children took turns over Thursday afternoon to read their stories aloud to their peers, one little boy said, 'I am a real author now!'		
Maths 4 m and 2 and 2 bouts 2 s 1	 Patterns within 10 This week's focus has been on assessing and deepening the children's understanding of mathematical relationships within numbers to 10. The activities encouraged: assembling a whole object from different parts making a whole number from 2 parts splitting some numbers into 2 groups that each have an equal amount recognising that 2 equal groups can make a double, e.g. double 3 is 6 altogether understanding that double patterns are even; they have 'flat tops' because they are made of 2 equal groups understanding that odd numbers cannot be split into 2 equal groups; they're not doubles, they have an 'odd block'/'odd one out'

Rea News

Spellings Practising words with ti making sh (eg action) and practising words and spelling patterns that we have found tricky in our independent writing.

Phonics will be revisiting: 'al' making the 'ar' sound as in half; 'a' making the 'or' sound as in always; o-e making the 'u' sound as in love and above; and 'ear' making the 'air' sound as in wear.

Homework for Rea class is:

- Reading regularly (at least four times) and practising your sounds from the back of your reading record..
- 15 minutes numbots (TTRS year 2).

Maths

In maths we will be: using tables for sorting; finding information from timetables and weather tables; using tally charts and our knowledge of counting in fives to gather and interpret information; constructing and interpreting in block graphs; finding out about the vocabulary used when making a block graph and constructing and interpreting pictograms.

The importance of school attendance - make sure your child isn't missing out.

Did you know?

- The pupils with the highest attainment at the end of key stage 2 and key stage 4 have higher rates of attendance?
- Pupils not meeting the expected standard in reading, writing and maths at the end of KS2 have a higher absence rate than other children?
- At KS4, absence for pupils not achieving a grade 9 to 4 was more than twice as high as those achieving grade 9 to 5 (8.8% compared to 3.7%)?
- For our most vulnerable pupils, regular attendance is an important protective factor in making sure trusting relationships are built, needs are identified and support is given?

The message is clear:

If children are in school they do better and are supported better.

We know some pupils find it harder than others to attend school and we want to build strong trusting relationships with pupils and parents to ensure no-one is missing out.

So what is good attendance? Below is a chart that may help understand:

We are seeing a significant increase in holidays in term time. **Holidays in term time are not an exceptional circumstance and do significantly disrupt learning patterns.** There are 190 school days in an academic year leaving 175 days free for families and those working in education to take holidays. Summer Holiday Fun in Shropshire with HAF (Holiday Activities & Food) – Bookings Open!



Bookings are now open for the Summer Shropshire HAF (Holiday Activities & Food) programme.

There are free places available on the programme for children and young people aged 4 (reception class age) to 16, who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals. There are also a limited number of free places available for children and young people living in areas of high deprivation and/or from low-income households, who are not in receipt of benefits related free school meals. These children and young people can be referred onto the programme by a professional. Places are also available for Ukrainian families, currently staying in Shropshire with host families.

Toilet Project at St. Marys Church, Stottesdon

Please see message below from Chris Tibbits regarding the Heritage Project news.

As a school we use the Church a lot, if you are able to support in anyway it would be very welcome.

Here, at last, is an opportunity for everyone in the community to contribute to the project: it has always been our intention to provide a toilet facility as part of the massive restoration investment at St Mary's. Sadly, as much more than planned had to be spent eliminating the dry rot and replacing the roof coverings with 33,000 new tiles, we are **short of between £20-25,000** to meet this most 'basic of needs'. We should explain that, with no mains drainage on site, the loo is not a cheap facility.... it has to be 'off grid' composting toilet since a septic tank is not appropriate in a churchyard. So this is an urgent call for financial help to complete the job - we have a most generous grant from the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust and a donation from one local business to get us underway can you help towards the remaining £11-15,000?? Please get in touch if you might be able to assist - and thank you so much for thinking about this!
