## **Key Information**

- Arrangements for Parent/Pupil/Teacher Meetings are now available, please request bookings as soon as possible.

## Covid 19: Please continue to remember:

- People who have Covid symptoms or have a positive PCR result have to isolate (10 days).

Close contacts of positive cases will be notified. Close contacts do not have to isolate if they: are **fully** vaccinated/ are below the age of 18 years 6 months/ have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial/ are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons).
 <u>Close contacts are asked to do a PCR and regular LFD tests.</u> If your children are informed they are close contacts, of cases outside school, please let us know and confirm test results.

- Please be reassured that, for the vast majority of children, COVID-19 will be a mild illness and that, in addition, the vaccine programme is providing protection.

- If we get a pattern of cases again, we will 'step up' our measures as appropriate.



## **Daily Reflection or Prayer**

This week we have continued our theme of hope by:

Nursery Talk for Writing: Monkey and Me

The nursery children can retell the story 'Monkey and Me' and create movements/ actions to act out the different animals the characters meet.

Reception Talk for Writing: Owl Babies

The reception children have been learning to retell the story 'Owl Babies' using a simple story map. We have introduced story phase actions for 'once upon a time', 'who', 'first', 'next' and 'then.

We have explored the feelings of the characters at different points of the story, learning new vocabulary such as heartbroken, gloomy, abandoned, teary, excited, surprised, shocked, delighted and joyful. We have had a go at nest building too. We have even tried drawing a story map and attempting some brave writing "Bill is sad."

The project aims to encourage pupils' creativity and design skills whilst also raising funds for our school.

Not only would it be very exciting for your child to see his/her work as a finished printed product, but the cards themselves are also great for sending a more personal greeting to friends and family at Christmas and the mugs are great for gifts!

Over the next two weeks, please design and complete a piece of artwork on either A4 or A5 sized paper or card at home. The artwork can either be landscape or portrait. Siblings may want to complete a collaborative piece of artwork together. Once completed, please attach the artwork to the A3 order form sent home on this Friday. Please do not use staples, paperclips or Sellotape as it may spoil the artwork.

You can then order the Christmas cards, mugs, spiral books, wrapping paper, gift tags etc. with your child's design online at <u>https://xmas.cauliflowergroup.co.uk</u> using your unique code at the top of your order form. Payment must be made online using the unique code located at the top of the pupil order form. Please refer to your order form for further instructions.

What are you most interested in focussing on in your role as Governor at Stottesdon?

- How students are prepared for their next steps, both within the primary school and beyond
- The use of awards, achievements and other forms of praise, and the avoidance of bias in their use
- The teaching of science (from both the teachers' and pupils' perspectives)

What do you think is the most unique feature of Stottesdon Primary School? The highly positive learning environment that all staff have created and maintained, even in the most difficult of times. Those of us that work within secondary schools and FE can only aspire to such a positive learning environment!


