
given their half-termly age-appropriate No Outsiders picture books to promote more discussion and thoughts on this subject.

• Reverend Daborn visited and brought the story of 'Jesus and the Taxman' (Luke 19: 1-10). We reflected on that if a person is sorry and forgiven for something they usually want to show that they mean to behave differently in the future. Zacchaeus, in the story, went to great effort to make up for his wrong choices. Children reflected on

how we show we are sorry by the way we behave after we have apologised.

 Open the book retold the story of The Wise King (Soloman) and reflected on the need for wisdom when we have difficult jobs or decisions to make.

 Phase assemblies either explored the forgiveness theme more or considered wisdom and bravery of leaders in connection to Ukraine (age appropriate).



#### COVID ADVICE

We will all be aware of the increase of cases within the community and nationally. When we are aware of positive cases we will notify classes by email to keep you updated.
Points below summarise advice for our education setting:

- Regular testing for pupils and staff is no longer recommended (if people want to continue that is a personal choice). LFT's should be used if symptoms develop.
  - If you have Covid symptoms or a positive test result you should stay at home and avoid contact with others.
  - If you have Covid you are advised to isolate for at least 5 days and then until you have 2 negative LFT results on consecutive days.
- If we have an outbreak, local public health may advise regular LFD tests to help manage the outbreak and we may use some of our step-up measures (as previously).
  - Staff, children and young people who are contacts should attend their education settings as usual.
  - We continue to encourage vaccine take up and are persevering with hygiene/ventilation measures.

Information for parents and carers on COVID-19 vaccination for at risk 5 to 11 year olds Children aged 5 to 11 years who are in a clinical risk group or who live with someone who is immunosuppressed can get the COVID-19 vaccine, in line with advice set out by the . Eligible children include those with diabetes, immunosuppression, learning disabilities, and other conditions as outlined by the  $\cup$ K

Vaccinations help to increase protection against COVID-19, which is particularly important for those with underlying health conditions.

Further information is available in the guide for years published by UKHSA. We have published some frequently asked questions on the vaccination programme including information on eligibility, accessibility and advice for parents of children at high risk from COVID-19. Following advice from the JCVI, healthy 5 to 11 year old children will also be offered two 10 microgram doses of the COVID-19 vaccine. The NHS will prepare to extend this non-urgent offer to all children during April.

# Phonics

### Rea Class

Phonics next week for year one will focus on spelling words with oa, oe, o-e and o (all making the oa sound), particularly in polysyllabic words, and using phoneme spotters to identify them.

Year 2 spellings with focus on adding ing, ed, er, est and y to words of one syllable after a single short vowel eg pat becomes patted, skip becomes skipping and fit becomes fitter.

Homework will consist of: \* reading 4 times per week, \* practising the spellings marked in the back of reading records, \* a minimum of 10 minutes numbots and \* a short piece of writing in your homework book.


FoSPS Dates for the diary:

There is also an adult hamper so donations to that would also be welcome.






